Male condom

What is the male condom?

The male condom is a long sheath that can be made out of latex, rubber or non-latex material that is rolled onto the erect penis before sexual intercourse. Male condoms work by preventing the ejaculated sperm from entering the vagina during sexual intercourse. Male condoms are an effective way of preventing both pregnancy and the transmission of STI's

How effective is it?

More than 98% effective contraceptive method.

Advantages?

Readily available and affordable. Can be used for oral, vaginal and anal intercourse. Male condoms are safe, effective and have no hormonal side effects.

Disadvantages?

Latex condoms may irritate both men and women. Condoms are only to be used once and then correctly discarded.

Prevent STI sand HIV?

Yes, male condoms help protect against STI's and HIV.

How to obtain it?

Fertility Control Clinic and your general practitioner. You do not need a prescription. Only you and your doctor can decide if this contraceptive method is right for you.



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
